We continue to support over 3,000 young people, 10,000 adults and 1,500 apprentices across a wide range of industry-related subjects at our six campuses – Nuneaton, Wigston, Hinckley, Harrowbrook, MIRA Technology Institute and at our Digital Skills Academy in Coventry.

COMMUNITY SKILLS HUB

PART OF NWSLC

NWSLC has launched its Community Skills Hub in response to the Government's 'Plan for Jobs' which includes a package of measures and cash incentives for businesses and a new 'kickstart' scheme to fund jobs for young people at risk of long term unemployment. The Community Skills Hub will help to signpost individuals to a range of support as well as creating links between skilled jobseekers and vacancies that are hard to fill.

Key opportunities include:

- A new 12-week traineeship scheme for those not yet ready, or unable to find, an apprenticeship
- A wide range of apprenticeship opportunities with support to find vacancies and succeed in interviews
- Pathways to the new Kickstart Job Scheme for those at risk of longterm unemployment
- Free distance learning short courses leading to Level 2 qualifications that help individuals to improve their skills or retrain
- Opportunities to gain professional accredited qualifications
- Help with English and maths qualifications including both GCSEs and functional skills
- Ways to prepare for university and routes into higher-level studies.

FORMER STUDENT WORKING AT THE

Katie Morrison's nursing experience was never in more demand than when she worked to support nurses returning to practice during the coronavirus pandemic. As a team leader at South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust, Katie and the team have been supporting colleagues in developing their knowledge and skills, helping them to feel safe as they tackled the challenges of COVID-19.

During a career with the NHS that has spanned over 14 years, Katie has become skilled in leadership, education, training and mentoring, and become qualified to Master's level. She credits the starting point of her career on her experience at NWSLC. Joining the college in 2000, Katie qualified in Health and Social Care and went on to study nursing at Southampton University. Katie's first post as a registered nurse was at Bassetlaw Hospital in the emergency admissions unit. Katie eventually moved back home to Nuneaton where she now works at Warwick Hospital.

Katie returned to study at Coventry University and became qualified in mentoring so that she could support student nurses on placement enabling them to successfully develop their competencies and move on with their careers.

As a lead in Practice Development Team, Katie returned to education once more, completing an MA in health studies on a part-time basis at Coventry University and graduated in cap and gown at Coventry Cathedral. Katie now works with nurses and medical students, helping them to develop their clinical skills and also supports nurses from overseas to become registered with the Nursing and Midwifery Council.

CHAPLAIN BRINGS COLLEGE COMMUNITY CLOSER

NWSLC is a nurturing community that offers all kinds of support to its staff and students including through its chaplaincy service which operates across all campuses. We talked to our chaplain, Rev Stephen Blyth, about his role. He said, "I act as a listening presence for everybody within the college, and also as a critical friend where required, helping people to make sense of what they are experiencing at this difficult time. Although I am not currently on site as much as usual due to coronavirus measures, I try to make contact with as many colleagues and students as I can. From a practical point of view, I oversee a Food Bank service for those who need extra support. I lead our efforts to mark Remembrance in an appropriate way each year. I also publish regular Thoughtful Thursday articles for staff and highlight a range of festivals from around the world, helping everyone to explore new perspectives and learn something about themselves in the process." APPRENTICESHIP PUTS DESHIN POLE POSITION

As part of his exciting role with precision engineering company, MP Engineering UK Ltd, Hinckley, Desh Ramji helps to produce the highly complex components that the Formula 1 Red Bull team relies on to maintain the edge over its competitors. Having completed his advanced apprenticeship earlier this year, Desh now works as a junior manufacturing engineer.

Desh, 24, from Kirkby Mallory spent two years working to achieve his qualification attending college on a day release basis and completing projects at work and in the evenings at home. He has already worked on helping to produce parts for the Red Bull team and is pleased that the season is finally able to get underway.

Desh had always been interested in cars and started his working life as a mechanic. He then secured a job with family-run MP Engineering

and, having achieved his apprenticeship, is undergoing in-house training as an 5-axis programmer.

MP Engineering, based in Hinckley, provides precision engineering to the motorsport, aerospace, and defence sectors. The company has been working with the college for over five years to train engineering apprentices, enabling them to acquire highlevel skills and secure exciting future careers in the industry.

Desh loves his job and really enjoyed his time at college. He said, "Each individual project is a challenge and you're learning something new every day. I also find it very rewarding when I have completed a task that contributes to the success of a big project. The college tutors were very supportive, and I would recommend an apprenticeship as a great route in to engineering."





COUNSELLING CAREER CHANGE FOR FORMER NURSE

Now studying the Level 4 therapeutic counselling programme at our Wigston Campus, Pippa Tite is making the transition from nursing to an alternative people-centred profession. Pippa said, "I used to be a nurse so when I left medicine I decided to begin a career in counselling as I still wanted to work with people. I wasn't sure what coming back into education would be like as it had been over 20 years, but I was immediately hooked. I am comfortable at the college, each tutor can see what we are good at and what we struggle with and they have helped me to find my confidence and continue to encourage me to progress both academically and personally. The most important thing for me is that, as an adult learner, I am autonomous; I have a choice in my education and the college supports that."



Sue's daughter Sam from Nuneaton started the 2+2 BA Hons in social studies just as her Mum was completing it. Sue had recommended the course to her daughter after Sam was made redundant when the funding for her youth work was withdrawn.

Sam has recently completed her degree at the University of Warwick, earning a 2:1 and has also been awarded a grade 7 for her English GCSE which she also studied at NWSLC. She has just started work as a support officer for a national regulator based in Coventry and is currently going through the induction process.

Sam said, "I was inspired by my Mum's success to take up the degree and the study arrangements were flexible enough to enable me to look after my son who is now aged five. Both my Mum and I had positive experiences of studying for the 2+2 degree. The support within college is fantastic; it feels like being part of a family. I would definitely recommend this route to others who are thinking about returning to education."

Lewis Dowell, 20, from Earl Shilton has completed an HND in Graphic Design in difficult circumstances during the coronavirus lockdown. However, I am feeling positive about getting freelance work because although businesses might not be able to offer me a job, there is always work available if you work hard to find it."

Lewis started college studying art and design and progressed on to the Level 3 graphic design course achieving distinction grades before taking the higher education route at the college's creative arts Hinckley Campus. He decided not to go to university but followed the Higher National Diploma option instead because it was more affordable and enabled him to continue living locally at home.
