COLLEGE LEADS ENGLAND IN

WOKLDSKILLS

UK MEDAL TABLE

AND SECURES TOP SPOT FOR FOUNDATION SKILLS COMPETITIONS

Students and alumni from North Warwickshire and South Leicestershire College (NWSLC) have been celebrating as they collected 16 medals at the national WorldSkills UK finals putting the college at the top of the medal table in England, and fourth in the UK. Impressively, it has also been named the highest performing college overall in the foundation skills category. Medal-winning competitors picked up five Gold, three Silver and eight Bronze medals as the results were announced live by Steph McGovern from her Channel 4 'Packed Lunch' studio.

Gold medal winners included NWSLC alumni Maddie Lock, who earned the top position in the visual merchandising skills competition. Maddie is currently studying for a degree in graphic design at the University of Brighton and is heading for a career in the creative sector. Apprentice Samuel Abbott, who works for E. Brook Joinery Ltd in Coventry, won the Gold medal for his joinery skills. Sam will now go forward for a chance to compete for a place in Squad UK as it prepares for WorldSkills in Lyon in 2024.

In the foundation skills categories, Kelys Ramsay who is studying at the college's Nuneaton Campus, picked up the Gold medal for hairdressing skills. The catering skills competition saw professional cookery student Georgina Price take the Gold medal, and Samuel Barnes from Leicester, who is working to qualify as an autocare technician, won his Gold medal for motor vehicle skills.

The Silver medals were won by Abbie Simpson for visual merchandising, Sinead Hitchman for foundation hairdressing and Callum Hearne in the foundation health and social care category. Bronze medallists included Jake Benson, Reece Todd, Ryan Maguire, and Frankie McCarthy in the digital media production skills competition. Meghan Shields won Bronze for visual merchandising and Grace Elliott picked up the Bronze medal for creative makeup skills. Casey McFarlane won a Bronze medal in the foundation catering category, and Lewis Smith collected Bronze for foundation health and social care.

Marion Plant, OBE FCGI, Principal and Chief Executive of North Warwickshire and South Leicestershire College, who is also deputy chair and trustee of WorldSkills, said,

"We're absolutely thrilled with the outcome of the competition this year and so proud of all our students who worked so hard to achieve such fantastic results."

We are delighted that our students excelled in the foundation skills competitions, placing our college at the top of the league table for the whole of the UK. Foundation skills competitions, designed for those with special educational needs and disabilities, were originally conceived and first started by NWSLC, so we are particularly proud of our success in this area."



ROAD TO SHANGHAI

In addition to the college's recent success, previous Gold medal winners from NWSLC are continuing to train to represent the UK on the world's stage at the bi-annual WorldSkills competition in Shanghai in October 2022. Former student and Nuneaton chef Chloe Lloyd-Hughes will compete in the culinary arts category while Ellie Ruff will take on challenges in visual merchandising. Both are members of the prestigious WorldSkills UK Talent **Development Programme having** previously excelled in its national skills competitions.

ON JASON HARLOCK CARPENTRY AND JOINERY LECTURER

"I have worked for the college for seven years based at Wigston Campus and I also teach bench apprentices at Harrowbrook Campus. I served on a five-year indentured apprenticeship in carpentry and joinery and have worked all over the country on site



carpentry, shop fitting and exhibition work. I've been in education for the last 20 years but have always kept my industry experience up to date. I have been involved with supporting carpenters in building the skills they need to achieve the required entry points enable them to emigrate to Australia.

"It has been a pleasure to teach Sam Abbott since he started his joinery apprenticeship; he is a very talented, enthusiastic and motivated learner, and has done so well to win the Gold medal for joinery in a relatively short space of time."

BUILDING SKILLS FOR THE FUTURE

was part of the national final
of SkillBuild UK at the National
Construction College in Norfolk. He
was challenged with crafting a door
from wood including moulding and
decorative elements using a technical
drawing. Carpentry and joinery tutor Jason Harlock
supported Sam's competition journey.

Sam was always interested in how things were made and went straight into a carpentry and joinery course at NWSLC's Harrowbrook Campus when he left Coundon Court School in Coventry. E. Brook Ltd is a family-run business that has been operating since 1947. Sam is working on domestic joinery crafting staircases, windows, and doors for house-building projects across the UK.

Sam said:

"I am delighted to have won the Gold medal for joinery and look forward to getting the chance to compete for a place in Squad UK for WorldSkills in Lyon in 2024. I want to try and go as far as I can in the competition. I am really pleased that I started on this journey to become a joiner and I am enjoying my time with E. Brook."

merchandising and the possibilities of working

in the sector. I was actually ill in bed during the

medal ceremony but my uni flatmates helped

me to celebrate by bringing me a nice cup of tea."

Abbie Simpson, Silver-medal, from
Leicester has a passion for graphic

design after she left school and visited NWSLC's
creative arts campus at a college open event. Abbie

Four students competed as a team in the finals of the digital media production competition, supported by our creative arts and design lecturer John Watson, in which they were challenged to produce a TV news report on climate change against the backdrop of the COP26 summit.

Frankie McCarthy, Bronze medallist, from Nuneaton was inspired by storytelling from a young age and has wanted to be author since he was five years old. He has already written 90,000 words of a novel set in 1066 inspired by his love of history. Frankie, now studying creative media production, has set his sights on a career as a screenwriter and director, bringing stories to life through the medium of film.

Frankie said:

"I have been researching the background to my novel and I have travelled to Battle in East Sussex to explore 1066 country for myself. For the WorldSkills UK competition, I led on the camera work. I am quite competitive and was delighted to see us reach the podium."

Nuneaton's Ryan Maguire, Bronze medallist, who attended Higham Lane School lived in Shanghai for a year and worked as an apprentice at the Engineering Technology Education and Research Centre making films to showcase the work of design technology teachers at the centre.



Ryan said:

"We went to China for a year as a family and I really enjoyed it. I loved the food, and the Chinese people were very friendly and welcoming. When it comes to making films, my specialism is in editing. I am really enjoying the creative media production course and have already learned a great deal. It has been great to win the medal with my teammates at WorldSkills UK."

Jake Benson, Bronze medallist from Nuneaton is in the second year of his course in Creative Media Production at the college's Hinckley Campus having joined from Hartshill Academy. Jake has an ambition to be a filmmaker building on the success of his YouTube channel 'Theme Park Jake' which already has over 1,000 subscribers.



Jake said:

"I have been managing my own YouTube channel for the last five years. As 'Theme Park Jake', I have travelled the world trying out and reviewing theme parks and recommending individual rides. I was inspired by a trip to Alton Towers when I was 12 years old and since then, I have travelled all over the world including to Japan and the United States making video reviews of theme parks in exchange for free tickets. I would like to study film-making at university next year."

Reece Todd, Bronze medallist, from Bedworth who attended Nicholas Chamberlaine School had always wanted to be an actor from a young age, Reece's experiences in college have prompted a change of direction and he would now prefer a role behind the camera making feature films. Reece said:



"I really enjoy film-making and have made quite a few already since joining the college. I would love a creative role in film and TV drama and my strengths lie in scriptwriting. I always enjoyed English at school and have been developing my writing skills since then. I enjoyed working with the other three students in my team as part of the WorldSkills UK final. We all have different skills and complement each other which helped us to achieve a great result."

His skills test required him to carry out a technical procedure on a vehicle in a workshop making sure that safe working practices were followed.

"Achieving second place in the competition has really boosted my confidence. I have really enjoyed the whole process because it has made me focus on my work and improve my skills. It really has made me push myself and I want to keep improving as I continue to learn."

Their tutor Zoey Armitage said, "Both Kelys and Sinead have worked hard to perfect their styles over the last few weeks and their commitment really paid off. Even on the morning of the competition, they were so well-prepared and showed their dedication and professionalism; I couldn't have been prouder of them.
