PLACES IN SQUAD UK FOR 'SKILLS OLYMPICS'

Students and alumni from North Warwickshire and South Leicestershire College are set to represent the UK on the world's stage following their selection for Squad UK as part of the international WorldSkills competition. The talented trio includes Leicestershire's Saskia Godley from Stoney Stanton who is due to compete in the visual merchandising category. Saskia is joined in her category by graphic design student Ellie Ruff and culinary arts competitor Chloe Lloyd-Hughes, both from Nuneaton. All three will compete for the chance to represent the UK at the bi-annual event in Shanghai in 2021 known as the 'Skills Olympics'.

Students from across the college triumphed at the national finals of the WorldSkills UK LIVE competition in November 2019 putting the college in first place in England after winning five Gold medals, six Silver and three Bronze medals overall. WorldSkills UK LIVE is an inspirational showcase designed to highlight the latest training, education and job opportunities. As part of the three-day event at the NEC in Birmingham, students from across the UK who have been successful in regional heats compete with their peers in around 70 skills challenges. Twenty-one students from North Warwickshire and South Leicestershire College took part having already achieved success in regional heats.
