BBC RADIO LEICESTER PRESENTER CUTS KIRRON TO LAUNCH COLLEGE FLOKISTS




A new florist service run by students at Hinckley Campus has been officially launched by BBC Radio Leicester's morning show presenter Summaya Mughal. Summaya visited the college to meet the floristry team as they opened retail outlet Creative Blooms for the first time. The service, which is open to the public, will enable students to develop customer service and commercial skills as part of their training to achieve floristry qualifications and prepare to enter the industry.

Summaya talked to tutors Megan Lomas and Alex Slater about their journeys from industry into teaching, and to students Emily Trivett and Kelly Bickle who are both studying floristry full-time as part of lifechanging career moves.

Emily has a background in farming and agriculture and has set up her own floristry business on the farm where she is based. Kelly previously worked in food manufacturing and settled on her change of direction during lockdown.

Creative Blooms takes delivery of grade A flowers from Holland each week enabling it to offer a range of bouquets, sprays and wreaths that can be ordered online and collected on the same day if required.

UK MEDAL TABLE

AND SECURES TOP SPOT FOR FOUNDATION SKILLS COMPETITIONS

Students and alumni from NWSLC have been celebrating after they collected 16 medals at the national WorldSkills UK finals putting the college at the top of the medal table in England, and fourth in the UK. NWSLC was the highest performing college overall in the foundation skills category. Medal-winning competitors picked up five Gold, three Silver and eight Bronze medals in total.

Gold medal winners included NWSLC alumni Maddie Lock, who earned the top position in the visual merchandising skills competition. Maddie is currently

studying for a degree in graphic design at the University of Brighton and is heading for a career in the creative sector.

Apprentice Samuel Abbott, who works for E. Brook Joinery Ltd in Coventry, won the Gold medal for his joinery skills. Sam will now go forward for a chance to compete for a place in Squad UK as it prepares for WorldSkills in Lyon in 2024.

In the foundation skills categories, Kelys Ramsay who is studying at the college's Nuneaton Campus, picked up the Gold medal for hairdressing skills. The catering skills competition saw professional cookery student Georgina Price take the Gold medal, and Samuel Barnes from Leicester, who is working to qualify as an autocare technician, won his Gold medal for motor vehicle skills.

The Silver medals were won by Abbie Simpson for visual merchandising, Sinead Hitchman for foundation hairdressing and Callum Hearne in the foundation health and social care category. Bronze medallists included Jake Benson, Reece Todd, Ryan Maguire, and Frankie McCarthy in the digital media production skills competition. Meghan Shields won Bronze for visual merchandising and Grace Elliott picked up the Bronze medal for creative makeup skills. Casey McFarlane won a Bronze medal in the foundation catering category, and Lewis Smith collected Bronze for foundation health and social care.

Marion Plant, OBE FCGI, Principal and Chief Executive of NWSLC, who is also deputy chair and trustee of WorldSkills, said, "We're absolutely thrilled with the outcome of the competition and so proud of all our students who worked so hard to achieve such fantastic results.

"We are delighted that our students excelled in the foundation skills competitions, placing our college at the top of the league table for the whole of the UK. Foundation skills competitions, designed for those with special educational needs and disabilities, were originally conceived and first started by NWSLC, so we are particularly proud of our success in this area."

ROAD TO SHANGHAI

In addition to the college's recent success, previous Gold medal winners from NWSLC are continuing to train to represent the UK on the world's stage at the bi-annual WorldSkills competition in Shanghai in October 2022. Former student and Nuneaton chef Chloe Lloyd-Hughes will compete in the culinary arts category while Ellie Ruff will take on challenges in visual merchandising. Both are members of the prestigious WorldSkills UK Talent Development Programme having previously excelled in its national skills competitions.

STUDENT STARS AND GRADUATES HONOURED AT ONLINE AWARDS LELEKRATION

Students and graduates have been praised for their 'dogged determination to succeed against all odds' at a celebration event to recognise their achievements. The event, attended by over 200 guests, which was held on Friday 22 January, included an inspirational keynote address from Marion Plant, OBE FCGI, Principal and Chief Executive of NWSLC who highlighted how students from across the college had become much more agile and resilient as they tackled the issues presented by studying during the pandemic.

The celebrations recognised representatives of the 14,000 students and apprentices aged from 14-78 who studied with NWSLC last year completing qualifications from foundation to degree level across the college's six campuses.



Marion Plant said, "I have been impressed with the pace at which our students embraced remote learning and assessment and there is no doubt that the level of digital capability and confidence they achieved will serve them very well in future employment as all industry sectors become more and more digitised."

The event included a performing arts showcase and a presentation from former media student Lily-Ann Bedder from Burbage who now works as a creative consultant for Hinckley-based experiential design company Holovis. Lily-Ann is responsible for designing themed entertainment experiences for businesses including Merlin Entertainments which owns Alton Towers and LEGOLAND® Parks.
